2022 Pastor's Annual Report

From Pastor Carolyn,

"When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability." (Acts 2:1-4)

This year, our Annual Meeting comes on the Sunday of Pentecost. We will celebrate the Holy Spirit with the wearing of red and by having red paraments in our sanctuary recalling the red flames of the Holy Spirit. This year's dramatic reading about the Holy Spirit is from Acts. We are told about the arrival of the Spirit as a rush of violent wind with divided tongues like fire land on the disciples. Suddenly, the disciples have the ability to be understood in foreign languages. There were people from many lands and orientations present at the miraculous moment of Pentecost translating Jesus's message into languages from the Mediterranean North Africa, Western Asia, and Southern Europe. The outpouring of the Spirit, is a gift of God regardless of gender, class or age. From that moment on, Acts tells us that the Christian movement exploded with new converts being added by the thousands. Sometimes this is called the birth of the church.

After a couple of years of preparation and in conjunction with the Holy Spirit, Bethel extended a new call for a pastor in July 2021. It was no small feat to call a pastor during COVID and to keep the church going and worshiping together. Bethel had successfully reopened worship by the time I had arrived August 1. Together, the Leadership Team and I, have been navigating the ebbs and flow of the new variants of COVID and it's affect on worship always keeping the goal of offering a safe worship experience to all involved. This have meant that we have had to be flexible, which I believe we have done with grace this past year.

This coming year, I am hoping to begin offering some additional adult opportunities, such as:

- an evening study,
- a coffee book discussion, or
- a spiritual gifts class.

For God's Work Our Hands on September 11, Bethel will be adding a new volunteer opportunity with Rise Against Hunger, an international nonprofit.

God has surely blessed this congregation with new life and I am excited to see where the Spirit leads us together. I trust the wind of the Holy Spirit that forms the church and urges us outside the walls of the church to carry us out on the mission and ministry of Christ in the world.

PRESIDENT MESSAGE June 2022

June 2022 started out with a rush of activity as Bethel wrapped up a lengthy, COVID impacted, call process. Our final candidate, Carolyn Brodt, was presented to the congregation at several Meet & Greets. Lisa & Matt Herlocker and Allan & Linda Dunn hosted gatherings in their homes for congregational members to talk with Pastor Carolyn. The Congregational Life Team also hosted an opportunity after worship one Sunday. In July we officially voted to call Pastor Carolyn as our new pastor. Her first official Sunday leading us was the first Sunday in August. In September, Pastor Carolyn was officially ordained and on All Saints Sunday, we hosted the official Installation Celebration for Pastor Carolyn with Bishop Meghan Rohrer officiating and including a delicious BBQ dinner.

After over a year of COVID restrictions, Bethel was finally able to meet in person and hold worship services outside with congregation still needing to wear masks beginning in May. By the end of June we were able to move services into the sanctuary with everyone continuing to be required to wear masks. It was so nice to be able to have services with the congregation in-person.

As COVID risks have been lessened due to vaccines and low transmission rates, it has been nice to have in-person events again. Christmas Tree Decorating, Advent & Lent soup suppers, and Easter activities onsite at Bethel together as a congregation instead of on Zoom are just a few examples. Understanding that not everyone is ready to return to fully onsite worship, we have also continued to have live streaming via Zoom each Sunday.

Working with Servant team we have been busy taking care of Pastor Carolyn office, getting equipment in order to continue with Zoom on Sunday mornings, taking care of security issues and scheduling the sanctuary's outside stucco to be repaired and painted in June 2022.

Servant Team continues to meet on the 2nd Thursday each month via Zoom which is convenient with our busy work schedules.

I want to thank everyone for your devotion to keeping Bethel going during COVID-19 and volunteering when we need help. It is so great that Bethel congregation is so awesome and I'm so glad to be back in person again. Let's keep Bethel going and thank you Pastor Carolyn for helping guide us into the future of Bethel Lutheran Church.

Community Action Team or C.A.T. Annual Report June 2022

The Community Action Team (C.A.T.) is a committee dedicated to supporting the Roseville Community, including St. Vincent de Paul feeding program, as well as our sister Parish in Rwanda, and St. John's Program for Real Change in Sacramento. We meet whenever a need is identified. We are continually looking for volunteer opportunities to serve our community, and we welcome any ideas from our caring family members at Bethel. Please feel free to discuss any ideas or concerns with any of our committee members. We lost several key members over the past few years and would like to extend an invitation to any of Bethel's members who wish to serve our Lord by helping out on our committee or taking the lead on any special volunteer activity or project.

This past year, C.A.T. has been actively supporting the community in the following ways:

- 1. Bethel's members are active in the Ecumenical Feeding Program in Roseville. For questions or to sign up to help, contact Scott Larson.
- 2. This past September for the ELCA's God's Work Our Hands Sunday project, we collected cleaning supplies for Lutheran Social Services.
- 3. Members of Bethel support St. John's Program for Real Change (a homeless shelter for

women & children in Sacramento) in various ways. We maintain a current list of items needed and donations can be placed in the white basket in the back of the sanctuary. We host our annual "shopping mall" for the kids at the shelter using Bethel donations. Kids are able to "shop" and wrap a gift to present their moms on Christmas morning. This past Easter, we continued our tradition of bringing the children Easter baskets. The Spirited Women's group continues to finish the drawstring backpacks to be filled with needed items for clients entering the shelter. Due to coronavirus restrictions, we were not able to have our annual "May Panty Drive" for the women of the shelter, but plan to resume it next year.

4. Lastly, we had a visit from Amani Simbayobewe of the Rukundo Foundation in Rwanda. Amani is a graduate of the Rwanda Leaders School (formerly Rwanda School Project) an institution supported by the people of Bethel as part of our over 20 years of connections with ministry in that country.

FEEDING THE HUNGRY 2022

Faith Foundations Annual Report 2022

Faith Formation – Christian Education – Sunday School – whatever we call it, after a global pandemic it looks a lot different than we've always known! But since we know that faith is first built and strengthened in homes and not just at church, we've adapted and found new ways to grow. This year, that actually meant a significant drop in the number of organized faith formation activities for children, but an uptick in options for adults.

For adults, the arrival of Pastor Carolyn last summer, meant that eventually, when it seemed safe, a Sunday morning in-person adult Sunday School option returned. Knowing that not everyone was comfortable returning on-site yet, we found a way to use technology and bring those at home into the discussion. The group is currently wrapping up a study of the Gospel of Luke.

Our Little Lutherans participated in fewer in person activities but did manage to fit in a pool party last summer and pumpkin painting in October. As school picked up in the fall, it became apparent that the best gift Bethel could give families was individualized support and space just to rest. Families received activity bags for Advent and Holy Week that included Bible and craft ideas that families could use at their own pace. Weekly Kids' Bulletins and coloring pages are provided Sunday mornings as tools for faith formation – and as always, adults are free to use them too. We were able to return to an in-person, children's led Christmas Program and as always, our Little Lutherans participated with enthusiasm. The return to onsite worship as also opened up opportunities for our younger members to participate in worship leadership. They help serve communion, collect offering, and share spontaneous liturgical dance routines. May we all participate in worship with their enthusiasm and spirit!

This past school year, Andrew Chan continued his confirmation studies with Pastor Carolyn and me. We worked our way through a study of the 10 Commandments and the Lord's Prayer. In the fall, Andrew will begin his final year of confirmation studies with a planned Affirmation of Baptism Rite in the Fall of 2023.

We continue to rotate sharing Kids' Messages during worship. I am grateful for the help of Jeri Wartena, Pastor Allen, and Pastor Carolyn with this task.

On a personal note, I love watching these kids grow and can't wait for them to become active youth group members! It's always a treat to worship with them, share a Bible story, or just have a chat! What a joy it has been to welcome new children into our midst through baptisms and new births! Aside from Bethel, I continue to share my gifts with the larger church, too, and hope that my work in these areas leads to deeper connections for our congregation. I continue as the Adult Co-chair of the Sierra Pacific Synod Youth Committee and am on the Board of Directors of the ELCA Youth Ministry Network. I was the Synod Coordinator for the 2022 ELCA Youth Gathering until the tough decision was made to cancel it. I hope to use my talents in the role again for the 2024 Gathering cycle and encourage Bethel adults to consider applying to participate as a member of the Gathering Volunteer Corps.

I look forward to more shared adventures as we experience God's love together as a community of faith. If you have ideas or suggestions related to faith formation for the people of Bethel – of all ages – don't hesitate to talk with me about them. There's always room for new ideas!

Finance and Administration Team Report

(Fiscal Year 2021)

The Finance and Administration Ministry Team (F&A) is charged with the responsibility of monitoring and planning the congregation's financial assets and with the overall financial operational aspects of Bethel. Working closely with the Congregation Treasurer, F&A monitors cash flow, budget compliance, pays the expenses of the congregation, prepares payroll reports for both the Federal and State governments, and reports monthly financial operations to the Servant Team. Our Congregation Treasurer, Rick Mendonsa, serves as a member of F&A, is our representative on the Servant Team, and supervises the offering counters. Scott Larson provides regular reports on the congregation's financial activity to the Servant Team, pays our bills, and files required synod and government reports. Jeri Wartena, Bethel's Financial Secretary, is responsible for documenting tithing pledges and preparing annual member statements. Roger Linn is our legal counsel. Thanks to all for lending a hand.

Our members' tithe in 2021 was \$83,874, as compared to \$75,452, an increase of \$8,422. During this time Bethel had 38 giving units, the same as in 2020. Tithe is a combination of envelope, electronic and loose plate giving.

Our tenant, American Montessori Academy (AMA) receipts in 2021 were \$42,866 as compared to \$44,827 a decrease of \$1,961. AMA receipts are based on a base rent plus a percentage of tuition revenue. AMA has a maximum capacity of approximately 115 children. In 2019, pre-COVID our AMA receipts were \$66,455. We anticipate our AMA receipts return to per-COVID levels as the local economy recovers and need for preschool and childcare returns.

Net Income for 2021 was \$5,061. Included in that amount was an unbudgeted expenditure for the replacement of the HVAC unit in Lentz Hall for \$8,842.

As of December 31, 2021, Bethel's checking account had a balance of \$12,391, our savings account had a balance of \$127,281, and we received a payroll tax refund of \$24.22 for a total of \$139,697. Liabilities as of that date were \$277.50 for payroll taxes due in January. During the year the changes in the saving account balances are summarized below:

75th Anniversary Fund — member gifts in amount of \$3,109 Operating Reserve — transferred from checking to savings excess cash of \$40,000 Parking Lot/Building — Use of Facilities fees received from Incarnation \$3,800 Pastor's Discretionary Fund — Installation gifts and funeral fees of \$960 St Johns, Sunnyvale Gift (\$5000) — The Servant Team authorized gifts to Mt Cross Ministries, Lutheran Disaster Response (fire relief), and ELCA World Hunger of \$1000 each for a total of \$3000. An additional pledge of \$1,000 to St Vincent de Paul's Feeding Program was authorized, but not yet disbursed – as well as a pledge to use the remaining \$1000 for this fall's God's Work Our Hands project in conjunction with the group, *Rise Against Hunger*.

PROPERTY MANAGEMENT MINISTRY TEAM

June 2022 Report

The Buildings and Grounds Ministry Team is responsible for repair and maintenance of the parking lot, landscaping, exterior and interior of the Sanctuary and the buildings leased to American Montessori Academy (AMA).

In accordance with our lease with AMA, Bethel maintains a saving account with a balance of \$7,500.00 for emergency repairs for facilities necessary for AMA operations. During the past year, we performed basic plumbing maintenance on AMA leased buildings and trimming trees that overhang AMA playgrounds and buildings.

Our church ground efforts have focused on pulling weeds, sprinkler repairs, and trimming trees outside the AMA area.

We have monthly work parties on the second Saturday of each month. We want to thank the volunteers who have shown up to help weed, trim, and perform minor property repairs. Your dedication to Bethel has made an improvement to our street appeal and created a welcoming space for the children attending AMA programs.

- 3. Visit with shut-ins.
- 4. In the past, Bethel had a more formalized "Friends Helping Friends" program that included visitation and assistance with rides, meals, errands, shopping, and lawn or home care. If you need assistance or would like to volunteer in this capacity, please contact Kary. We'd like to know of needs and match volunteers to those needs.
- 5. If there is an immediate concern/issue, feel free to contact Shepherding. Together we can figure out where/who to reach out to...Pastor, Servant Team, etc ...depending on the need.

She accepted and was ordained at her home church, Lutheran Church of the Resurrection in Granite Bay, with Bishop Megan Rohrer presiding.
